

Yayoi Kusama / Yinka Shonibare



Questions

Ideally go through this process with each artist separately

There are many possible questions you could ask, to support students in looking at artworks. Here, we are asking them to first describe what they see, and then to compare the work they are looking at to other artworks.

Here, they can compare the focus artwork to siapo, hiapo and/or to the other of either Kusama or Shonibare.

Questions use Yayoi Kusama as an example

- Look at Yayoi's artworks and describe them
- How are these different to the art we've been looking at before? Siapo/hiapo/Shonibare
- How are they similar?
- Where might Yayoi be from, based on what you can see? What clues did you find in the artworks that suggested this to you?
- What do you wonder about this artwork/this artist?
- Do some research to find out more information (small group work)
- Share learnings with other groups/the whole class
- Based on what you have learnt, what stories do these artworks and their patterns tell about Yayoi's life?
- How does Yayoi's use of pattern help to share some of these stories?


